Fall 2018 Update

An interview with Karen Lebold, MennoHomes **Community Support Worker** By Nancy Regehr, Board Chair

Karen's first training and career was in early childhood education in London, Ontario followed by social services in child care and parent support in Grey and Bruce Counties in Ontario. She also supported her late husband in his work in child and senior support institutions. On returning to Waterloo Region she decided to look for part-time work and was pleased to hear about the Community Support Worker position at MennoHomes. She started her employment with MennoHomes in the fall of 2007.



I sat down with Karen in her office at Rockway Gardens Village at 1420 King Street East in Kitchener on October 16, 2018 to talk about her role as Community Support Worker.

Nancy – What attracted you to this position?

Karen – I have always been in jobs working

Community Support Worker with people. The role of Community Support Worker gives me the opportunity to work with children, families and seniors in a part-time flexible work schedule.

Nancy - What kind of support do you provide as a Community Support Worker?

Karen – I provide a variety of supports to our tenants. This might be listening to concerns or attending an appointment with a tenant who has no

other family support. Helping tenants find the appropriate community program to meet their needs is an important part of my job. At times I will mediate conflicts between tenants. I also help with planning social functions for tenants.

Nancy - Why is it important for MennoHomes to provide this kind of support for tenants?

Karen - In addition to providing affordable housing, MennoHomes also values the well-being of its tenants. The support I provide builds community and improves the quality of life for our tenants.

Nancy – What gives you the most enjoyment?

Karen – I find the work very interesting and rewarding as I build relationships with families with children as we have on Village Road in Kitchener and



with seniors as we have at Rockway Gardens Village in Kitchener. I have been known to visit with a pre-school child and a 95-yearold woman on the same day!

I enjoy being welcomed at the door with open arms by new arrivals to Canada who live in our buildings.



I enjoy sitting down with a tenant, chatting over coffee or tea, listening to concerns and helping that tenant take the next step in addressing their concerns. There are always new things to learn from each other as we share thoughts and ideas.

A MennoHomes Tenant Story

When Sara and Cornelius arrived in Canada six years ago from Durango, Mexico, they brought with them two children, some clothes, eighty dollars, and hope for a better future for their family.

They moved to the Wellesley area at the invitation of siblings. The birth of their third child brought additional challenges. Heinrich underwent open-heart surgery at only four months of age. The two months they spent at



SickKids in Toronto was hard. They had only been in Canada for one year and now found themselves in this large city hospital, unable to work and with no one able to help with translation.

When they returned to the Wellesley area, the old cold farm house they were renting was less than ideal for young Heinrich who remained on oxygen, but it was all they could afford. Fortunately, Esther Janzen, a Community Outreach Worker with Woolwich Community Services, a partner of MennoHomes, was able to help. With Esther's support, Sara and Cornelius moved in as MennoHomes tenants in 2014.

Heinrich's health has stabilized and he is now a very active fiveyear-old attending the local school. Their family has grown and Cornelius works for a local manufacturing firm. When asked how affordable housing has made a difference, he is quick to respond, "There are no other places we could rent like this! The house is in good condition and we have good neighbours." Sara adds "It's not fancy, but it has everything we need."
