



powerful than learning the impact affordable housing can have on someone's life than hearing about it directly from them, in their own words. That's why we were honoured to have Sharla Mabee consent to providing us with a glimpse into her life during an open conversation at our AGM. Immediately upon meeting Sharla, she started to break down the stereotypes that many of us still hold, possibly subconsciously, about who needs affordable housing. She was smiling and upbeat even as she shared some of her difficult history. As a child, Sharla and her mother

found themselves unable to keep the home she had grown up in due to a breakup of her mother's marriage. They lived together in a municipally operated affordable housing project, relying on food banks to help bridge the shortfall in their income. For Sharla, housing has been a struggle for most of her life. The experience of losing her family home impacted her so deeply she never felt she would have a place to call home, one

never relax or feel safe led to much stress and trauma in her life. Sharla suffered from depression as a result of how she had grown up, yet this just felt normal for her. When Sharla was old enough to move out and be on her own, she was quick to do so. But living on her own with a low income was difficult. Having to pay market rent eventually forced her to return to live with her mother. She felt defeated and trapped. When she was able to, she moved out again. Unfortunately, she found herself in an abusive relationship which led

that was just hers, that no one could take away from her. The overriding sense that she could

option but with the encouragement of her mother, she submitted an application to become a tenant at 544 Bridgeport. It felt like winning a lottery when she received the confirmation that her application had been approved; it had seemed impossible. While the challenges in her life didn't disappear immediately upon moving in, having an affordable place she could call her own did create the environment for positive change to take root. With a steady job, an abusive relationship behind her, and a newfound clarity that came with sobriety, Sharla has been able to discover who she really is and direct her life as she wants. Sharla continues to be deeply appreciative for the opportunity that was made available to her. Her story may have some trauma and some sad parts, but it is being re-written thanks to the generous support of our community.
